Comments:

At the time of the incident, the duty-holder was National Aluminium Limited, trading as NALCO. National Aluminum Limited has operated throughout New Zealand for many years.

In July 2016, National Aluminium Limited entered into a Joint Venture with Fletcher Building Products Limited. National Aluminium Limited and Fletcher Building Products are shareholders in Altus NZ Limited (known as Altus).

Altus specializes in design, manufacture, import and export of extrusion and rolled product, and distributes these products to both local and International markets.

Altus has factories in Auckland, Hamilton, Rotorua, Wellington, and Christchurch supplying one of the widest range of sheet, plate, treadplate, coil, and extruded Aluminium profiles in New Zealand.

As Altus is now the trading entity, the actions and Undertakings set out in this Enforceable Undertaking will be carried out by Altus.

Detail the contravention:

It is alleged by WorkSafe that National Aluminium Limited, as a Person Conducting A Business or Undertaking (PCBU) failed to comply with a duty, being the obligation in section 36 of the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015, to ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, the health and safety of workers whose activities in carrying out work are influenced or directed by the PCBU, while the workers are carrying out the work.

WorkSafe alleged that there were three practicable steps that could have been taken by National Aluminium Limited:

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- 1. Ensure that the Extrusion Press was adequately guarded to prevent entanglement
- 2. Develop, implement and monitor an adequate safe operating procedure for freeing tangled metal from the puller/run-out conveyor/cooling table area;
- 3. Ensure workers on the extrusion line are able to adequately communicate with one another.

Detail the events surrounding the contravention:

The worker was employed by ADECCO and was working at National Aluminum Limited's Hamilton Site. While involved in the operation of an Extrusion Press, the worker believed that another operator was directing the worker to enter an operational cooling table area of the Press. The worker entered the area to remove a piece of tangled metal. The run out conveyor on the cooling table reactivated, and the worker's overall leg became entangled and trapped in a rotating shaft which was not sufficiently guarded. The entangled overalls pinned the worker's leg to the shaft, the ankle was fractured when the shaft continued to rotate.

The worker was unable to attract the attention of the other operators to shut off the machine. When the worker's situation was identified, the operator activated the cycle-hold button rather than the emergency stop button. The two buttons were not readily distinguishable from each other. The worker suffered friction burns and a broken ankle.

Detail the rectifications to the workplace or work practices made as a result of the contravention, events and the enforcement notices issued:

<u>Guarding</u> Rotating shafts/coupling throughout the cooling/batching table identified, guarding designed, manufactured, and installed by 23/04/2016. Installation of full length guard of walking bench shaft completed by 07/05/2016. [Approximate cost \$10,000]

<u>Lockout</u> Additional Isolation protection designed, manufactured, and installed. This consists of a lockable control at tail stretch end for the tail stretch operator; key must be in position for machinery to be operated. Operator must turn key to isolate machinery, remove key while in cooling table area. The operator then replaces key and restarts machinery once in safe zone. Tail Stretch Lockout system installed 28/5/2016 [Approximate cost \$5,000]

<u>JSP</u> Job Safety Procedures for cooling table amended in coordination with WorkSafe inspector, including identified monitors. Tail Stretch Operator: 02/06/2016. Head Stretch & Puller Operator: 02/06/2016 Press Operator 02/06/2016 [Direct cost not identified]

<u>Decommissioning Machine</u> The Press on which the incident occurred has since been fully decommissioned and removed from the premises. National Aluminium Limited has invested heavily in a new extrusion press line which has a multitude of sensors associated with ensuring the safety of people. [Direct cost not identified as Press was already due to be decommissioned]

<u>Communication with Workers</u> Toolbox talks held with all workers who use that Press, on the next shifts after the incident. Workers made aware of the incident, the apparent causes, and the new requirements. [Direct cost not identified]

Detail the injury sustained or illness suffered by victim(s) or other(s) as a consequence of the contravention:

The worker suffered a fracture to his left lateral malleolus and partial thickness burns (friction) to the left hip, requiring skin grafts.

Detail the support provided or proposed to the victim(s):

A Manager went with the worker to hospital at the time of the accident, and notified the worker's family of the incident.

The Managing Director of National Aluminium Limited, personally made telephone contact with the worker on 3 occasions after the accident.

Hamilton Managers visited the worker in hospital and supported the family.

National Aluminium Limited (rather than his employer, Adecco) provided the worker with financial assistance (approximately \$200 cash) up to the time when ACC payments began. Payment of ACC confirmed the following day.

National Aluminium Limited offered Employee Assistance (Counselling) to both the worker and his family.

National Aluminium Limited worked with the worker's union to help ensure that there was a job available for him once he recovered.

The Managing Director spoke with, and then met with the worker and his mother on 15 December 15 2016, to check on his recovery and situation, and to offer him some further assistance. National Aluminium Limited has since made a payment to the worker in the sum of \$20,000 on 16December 2016 to recognise his suffering and the emotional harm that he has been through.

The Managing Director met with the worker and his mother again on 22 February 2017 to discuss the worker's progress, and to explain to the worker some of the commitments that National Aluminium Limited was considering as part of the Enforceable Undertaking. The worker discussed some of the issues the worker was having with ACC in relation to a secondary injury (an infection which required him to take significant time off work). National Aluminium Limited undertook to assist him with ACC.

The Hamilton Plant Manager met with the worker and the worker's mother on 29 March 2017. The worker agreed to allow National Aluminium Limited to assist with progression of a potential treatment injury claim with ACC.

National Aluminium Limited offered to pay 50 % of the worker's tertiary study fees for the next two years. However, the worker has now decided not to pursue further study.

The worker also suggested that as part of the Enforceable Undertaking, National Aluminium Limited support the worker's church volleyball team (The worker currently acts as umpire). National Aluminium Limited will make a financial contribution to the team, of approximately \$900.

On approximately 15 March 2017 National Aluminium Limited made a further compensatory payment of \$5,000 to the worker.

In April 2017, National Aluminium Limited attempted to assist with the worker's medical treatment and ACC claim/s.

In May 2017, National Aluminium Limited made a further compensatory payment of \$5,000. National Aluminium Limited has also offered to assist with EAP sessions.

Details any offer of amends or payments made to the victim(s) who sustained injury or suffered Illness

In addition to the non-financial support referenced above, National Aluminium Limited has made three separate compensatory payments to the worker. The total direct financial compensation to the worker has been \$30,000.

National Aluminium Limited also made a small cash payment to the worker shortly after the accident, prior to the worker's ACC claim being processed, and will also make a financial contribution to the worker's Church volleyball team in the sum of \$900.

Detail any current HSMS Implemented and maintained by the person:

National Aluminium Limited takes health and safety very seriously. The Board, Senior Management and operational managers are committed to making safety a key part of the business and have a goal (published on its website) of achieving zero harm through a combination of safety conscious culture and proactive risk management.

National Aluminium Limited's management of health and safety is summarised below:

HSMS:

A comprehensive Health and Safety Manual is used by all sites Nationwide.

H & S Manual Policies, Processes and Templates are available to all workers (with e-mail access) on a Nationwide Intranet. All H & S Polices are discussed at 'toolbox' (team) talks annually and continually displayed on all Department noticeboards.

National Aluminium Limited has maintained a Tertiary level of accreditation with the ACC Workplace Safety Management Practices. Part of the accreditation is verification from an external ACC auditor every 2 years that the company has:

- Robust Health & Safety Policies, including; (overall) Health & Safety, Training, Injury Management,
 Drug & Alcohol and Monitoring Workplace Exposures.
- · Evidence of an HSMS that contains;
- 1. H & S Action Plan
- 2. H & S Objectives
- 3. Hazard management system
 - a) Job Safe Procedures for every task
 - b) Department Hazard Registers
 - c) Safe purchase of Machinery
 - d) Risk Assessments
 - e) Incident Reporting system, with evidence of corrective actions.
 - f) Internal work area audits
 - g) External audits
- 4. Training needs identification, assessment and monitoring.

- 5. Injury Management and Rehabilitation.
- 6. Employee participation and engagement;
 - a) H & Safety Representatives on site.
 - b) H & S Committee.
 - c) Union Representatives.
 - d) Team Toolbox talks weekly, 2 way communication between workers and management.
- 7. Emergency Management procedures.
- 8. Contractor Management procedures.

Detail the consultation undertaken or proposed to be undertaken, in relation to this undertaking:

National Aluminium Limited has discussed the draft of the undertaking with the worker and his mother.

Section 2: General Terms

The person acknowledges and commits to the general terms set forth in the sub-terms below. It is noted again that the Undertakings given by National Aluminium Limited will, in substance, be carried out by Altus NZ Limited, the trading entity of National Aluminium Limited's joint venture.

Acknowledgement that the regulator alleges a contravention occurred

It is acknowledged that WorkSafe NZ alleges that National Aluminium Limited has contravened the provisions of the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015.

Statement of regret that the contravention occurred and the reasons the person considers this undertaking is the most appropriate response to the contravention

National Aluminium Limited deeply regrets that the incident in April 2016 occurred, and that serious injuries were suffered by the worker.

National Aluminium Limited considers that an Enforceable Undertaking is the most appropriate response to the contravention as it provides for a structured means of ensuring that positive changes and impacts come out of a very regrettable incident. It is National Aluminium Limited's intention that the undertakings given will benefit its workers, the wider industry, and the community.

Statement of commitment that the behaviour, activities and other factors which caused or led to the contravention has ceased and will not reoccur

National Aluminium Limited commits that the behavior, activities and other factors which led to the alleged contravention has ceased, and that National Aluminium Limited will, so far as is reasonably practicable, ensure that such circumstances do not arise again.

Acknowledgment of the policy published by the regulator for the acceptance of an undertaking

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges having read and understood WorkSafe's Enforceable Undertakings Operational Policy, December 2016

Acknowledgement that this undertaking will be published and publicised in full

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges that the undertaking will, if accepted, be published on WorkSafe's website in full and referenced in WorkSafe material.

Statement of the person's ability to comply with the terms of this undertaking and meet the projected costs of the activities

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges that it has the financial ability to comply with the terms of this undertaking and can provide evidence if required to further support this declaration.

In the event of impending receivership, liquidation or sale of the entity, National Aluminium Limited will advise WorkSafe of the relevant circumstances and its capacity to comply with the outstanding terms of this undertaking. WorkSafe acknowledges that National Aluminium Limited is no longer trading as a sole entity but that it has entered into a joint venture with Fletcher Building Products Limited and is trading as Altus.

Statement outlining any relationship between the person and any corporations, officers, employees, contractors, proposed beneficiaries of donations or scholarship or other recipient of financial benefit contained in this undertaking

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges that there are no known current relationships with any of the beneficiaries outlined in this Undertaking, except for the current workers of National Aluminium Limited, and the injured worker.

Statement regarding Intellectual Property

National Aluminium Limited grants WorkSafe a perpetual, non-exclusive, worldwide and royalty-free licence to use, for any purpose, all Intellectual Property Rights in relation to any material developed as a result of this undertaking. This licence includes the right to use, copy, modify and distribute the materials.

Acknowledgement that the person may be required to provide a statutory declaration

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges that it may be necessary for WorkSafe to obtain a statutory declaration outlining details of any prior convictions (safety related) outside of New Zealand and that it will provide such declaration if required by WorkSafe.

Statement of commitment from the person to participate constructively in all compliance monitoring activities for this undertaking

It is acknowledged that responsibility for demonstrating compliance with this undertaking rests with National Aluminium Limited.

Evidence to demonstrate compliance with the terms will be provided to WorkSafe by the due date for each term.

The evidence provided to demonstrate compliance with this undertaking will be retained by the person until advised by the regulator, that this undertaking has been completely discharged.

It is acknowledged that any failure to meet the due date for an enforceable term will result in the matter being escalated and may lead to enforcement action.

It is acknowledged that WorkSafe may undertake other compliance monitoring activities to verify the evidence and compliance with an enforceable term, and cooperation will be provided to WorkSafe.

It is acknowledged that WorkSafe may initiate additional compliance monitoring activities, such as inspections, as considered necessary at WorkSafe's expense.

It is acknowledged that details of all seminars, workshops and training conducted by a non-registered training provider must be notified to WorkSafe, by email, at least one week prior. Notification should include time, date, location and the trainer/facilitator.

Section 3: Enforceable Terms

National Aluminium Limited acknowledges all activities set forth in the enforceable terms below must be auditable and include a date for completion and an estimated cost for each activity.

National Aluminium Limited commits to performing the activities below diligently, competently and by the respective completion date.

A commitment by the person to perform activities that will ensure the ongoing effective management of risks to health and safety in the future conduct of its business or undertaking

National Aluminium Limited is committed to the effective management of risks to workplace health and safety.

The following approach will be taken to ensure this:

- Ongoing Workplace Health and Safety consultation with employees and contractors
- Ongoing risk assessments, along with regular updates and reviews of procedures to ensure the minimization of risks
- Arranging for relevant workers to participate in safety programs and training

National Aluminium is committed to undertaking the actions referred to below, which include initiatives intended to enable its senior leadership to be satisfied that the business can discharge its obligations under this undertaking.

A commitment by the person to disseminate information about this undertaking to workers, and other relevant parties

National Aluminium Limited agrees to disseminate information about the undertaking within the workplace, including to the members of any health and safety committee, health and safety representatives, workers and other relevant parties.
